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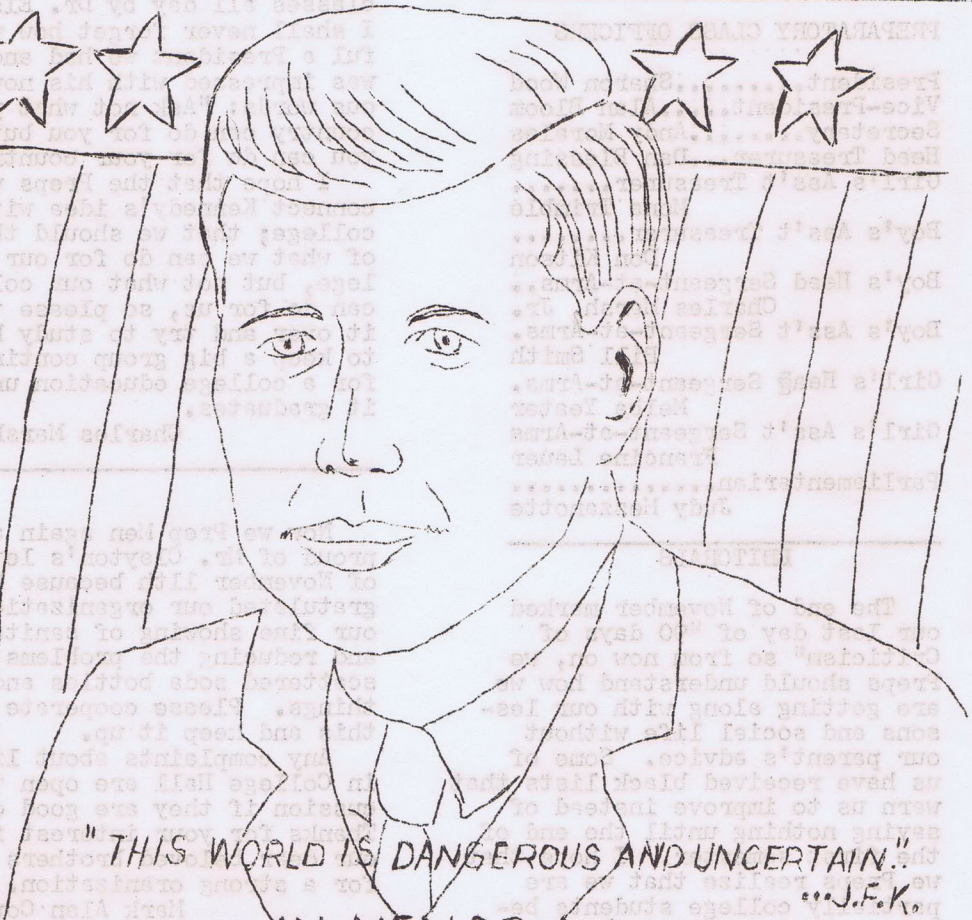

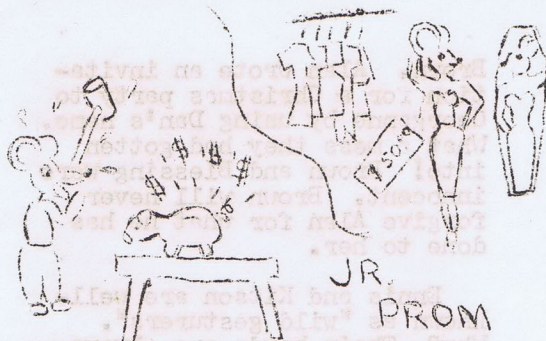
"The Cousins"

FOOTBALL

Although our Gallaudet College football squad was beaten in all eight games, the Preparatory boys performed well in playing football. We, the Preparats, are proud that John Kaleta scored the touchdowns and Don Aroma, the offensive end, caught a 30 yard touchdown pass from Al Couthen the sophomore quarterback despite our 14-12 loss to Lorton. What an amazing 5'6", 210 lb. Mike Burpo played the position as full-back!! The Preparats still build up the better strength of the squad. Next year the team will be better because it has developed more talent and experience in football.

BASKETBALL

John Kaleta, Bill Ennis, Bob Watson, Gary Hendix, Ed Woodside, and Larry Bowen are successfully participating in Varsity basketball. Bill Ennis, who is 6'4 1/2" from Texas-NY, could help the team by rebounding the ball. John Kaleta, who starts to practice basketball late because of football, is a fine all-around basketball player from Illinois. His height is nearly 6 feet. Bob Watson of Alabama rebounds well and throws a good jump shot at his height of 6'2". Ed Woodside, from Texas, who is 5'11", but his reach is 6'4", is a good dribbler shooter, and rebounder Gary Hendix of Washington throws a fine deadly jump and is able to shoot from the range of 25-30 ft. Larry Bowen from Oklahoma, who is 6', was the best all-American player in the Silent Worker three years ago for success in basketball.

SOCCER

Our soccer squad was beaten in seven of its nine games. The Preparats, including Zatko of

Western Pennsylvania (I forgot to put his name in the previous issue.) did well in fighting for the soccer team.

CROSS COUNTRY

In spite of a losing season, Bob Skedsmo and Karl Nygaard, who are two of the seven runners for Gallaudet, showed great efforts in the last two tournaments. Next year they will be much better runners.

WRESTLING

Mike Golightly, Dennis Emmendforder, Ken Fail, Arthur Roehrig Earl Hafer, and Mark Corson are participating in Varsity wrestling. Mike Golightly, who was the best 113 lb wrestler in the state of Arizona, is on the 123 lb. class. He beat Johnston an Alumni wrestler, who was once an Olympic wrestler. You better watch him wrestling. Dennis Emmendforder of Michigan, who weighs 235 lbs, wrestles in the unlimited class despite no experience. Ken Flail who could have been a regular football player, but injured his knee, will be in the 191 lb. class with his two years of experience in Pennsylvania. Mark Corson, who is below 110 lbs, has to eat more food to gain weight and to qualify for the 123 lb. class. Arthur Roehrig, of Wisconsin, will try to wrestle in the 177 lb. class with a lack of experience. Earl Hafer of California is a good wrestler in the 157 or 167 lb class with his 2 years of experience.

SWIMMING
