

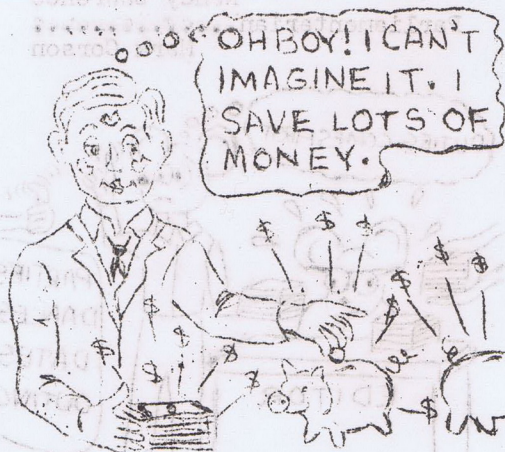
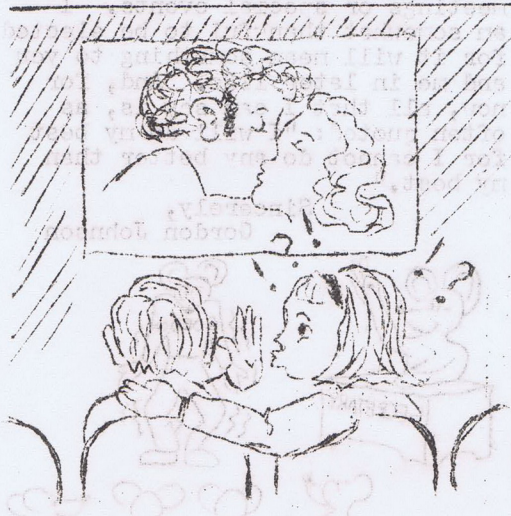
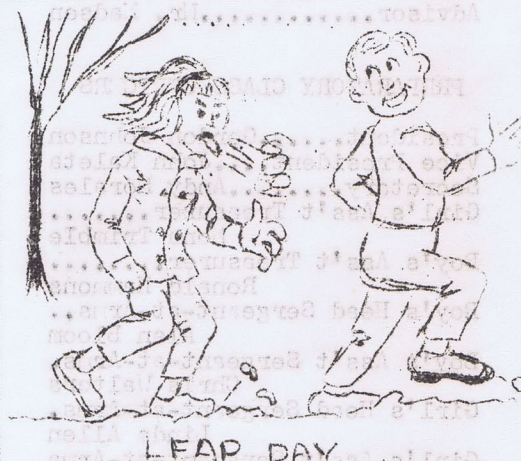

In this issue we have a new addition, "Shadow Box II" which may be interesting. Furthermore, we will explain what kind of paragraphs are to be written under this new title on another page.

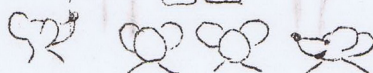
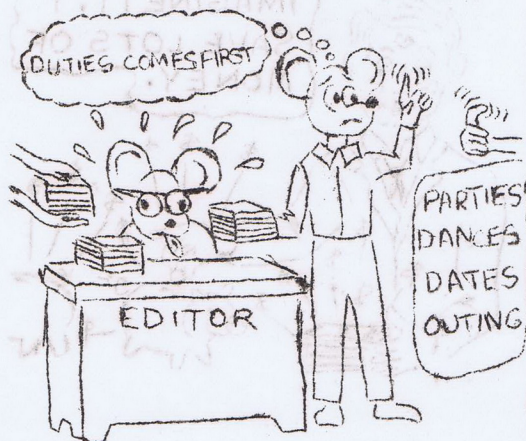

Goodbye, everyone!

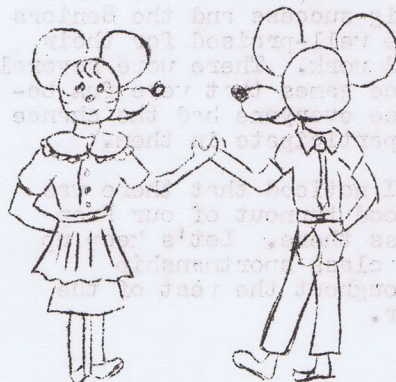

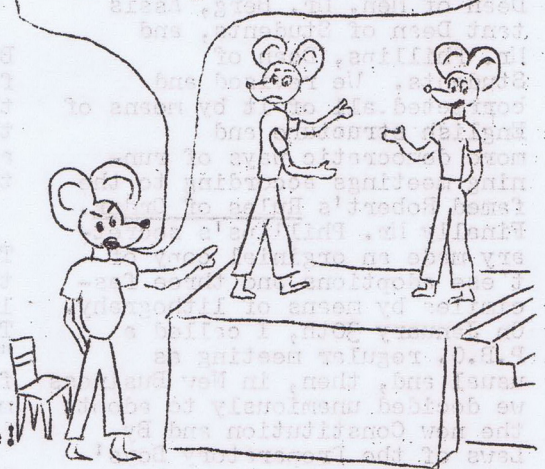

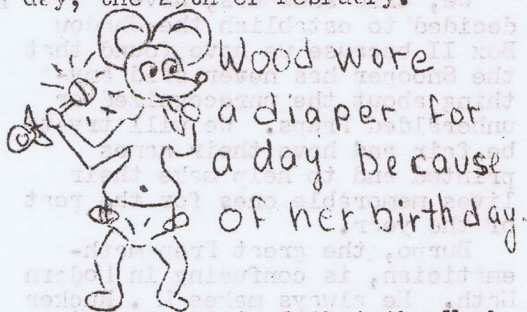

Jeanne White, coke drinker, can't even live without a drop of coke. She must be an addict to it.

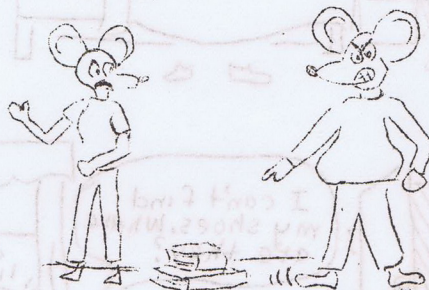
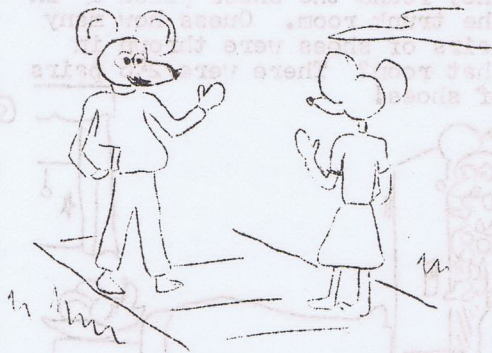
Tamor Manor, Mary's Lamb, always asked where is Mary? She must be her Lamb.

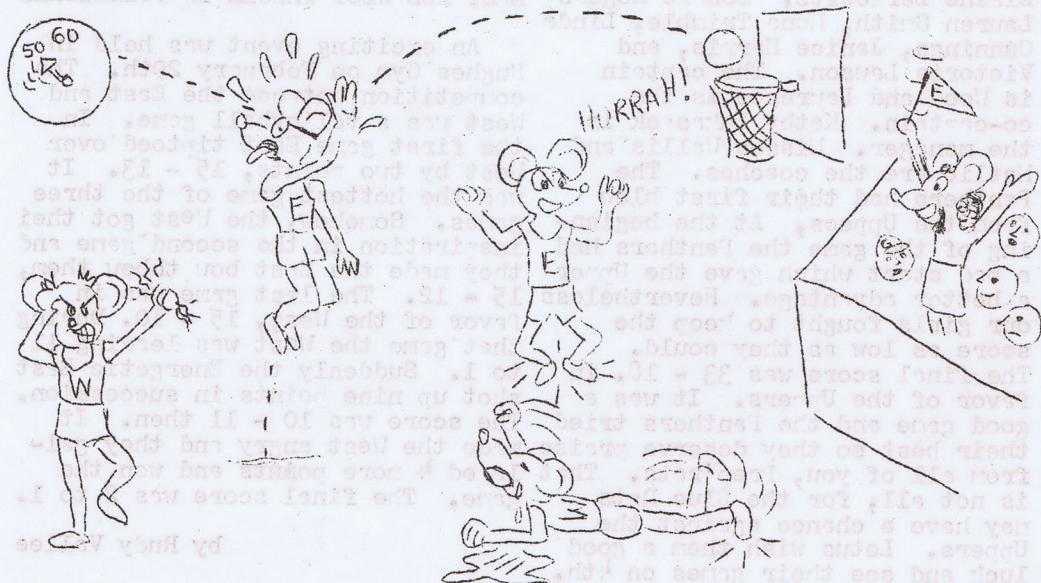

VARSITY ATHLETICS

WRESTLING

Our wrestling squad finally had two 5-4 won. lost record for Gallaudet College, whose other sporting teams failed to make more than 50% at winning. Mike Golightly and Earl Hafer, Preps, are regulars among the wrestlers. Mike absorbed his first defeat after five straight victories as he lost a decision to a Baltimore University wrestler who dropped to face matches. Earl Hafer who got a victory by forfeit, astonished spectators when he easily pinned a 191-lb man in the first round of an exhibition match. But our squad lost to Baltimore University by the score of 26 - 14. In the next meet against the University of Virginia, Mike was not able to wrestle because of his back injury. Earl Hafer lost 11 pounds overnight pinned the 123 lb wrestler of Towson State College. Although he was hampered by injuries. He rallied to inspire our squad to beat Towson by the score of 26-14. Mike lost a 4-1 decision to a Howard University wrestler because of an ankle injury in the first round; Earl Hafer was pinned by a strong undefeated 157 lb. wrestler of Howard University who beat us by the score of 23-12. In the Mason-Dixon Tournament at Loyola College in Baltimore, Mike Golightly and Earl Hafer were entered to wrestle. Earl Hafer, who is 157 lbs. himself wrestled in the 167 lb class, but was eliminated by being twice-pinned by wrestlers from Loyola College and Old Dominion College. He learned from that experience, and he'll be ready next year, we hope. Mike Golightly, a 123 lb wrestler from Arizona, pinned a Catholic University wrestler in the first round and beat an Old Dominion wrestler by a 6-4 decision. Mike advanced into the finals to face a tougher Baltimore University wrestler, who previously beat him by 14-1

decision. Mike avenged this by beating him in 2-1 decision though he was injury-ridden with two sprained ankles. He is the new CHAMPION of the 123 lb. class in the Mason-Dixon Conference. The Preps, are very proud of Mike being a terrific wrestler. Many congratulations to Mike the Great!

INDOOR TRACK

In the Mason-Dixon Indoor Track Championship at Baltimore Civic Center, John Dryeson and William Smith, both Preps, Al Couthen, and William Ramborger, both uppers, competed in the one-mile relay. Their timings were: Dryeson; 54.8, Smith; 54.4, Ramborger; 57; and Couthen; 53.2. The time of our one-mile relay was 3:39. I will tell you about more the Preps who are joining outdoor track next month.

BASKETBALL

Despite our 6-14 basketball record, John Kaleta, Edward Woodside, Gary Hendrix, Bill Ennis and Robert Watson showed their basketball talents to help strengthen the Gallaudet College basketball team. John Kaleta, who was the top rebounder on the squad, got 14 points and 11 rebounds and fouled out early as we bowed to Marian College of Indianapolis in a very close game. John got 20 points and 21 rebounds against Washington College, but unfortunately, we lost 88-82. We snapped our seven game losing streak as we beat Towson State College 64-56. Kaleta and Hendrix got 11 and 4 points respectively. We beat Salisbury College 72-71 as Kaleta and Hendrix scored 10 and 5 points respectively. We lost our final game, which the Preps were permitted to watch, to Bridgewater College, 64-58. We gladly saw Kaleta, Woodside, and Hendrix, who scored 17, 7, and 3 points respectively. SWIMMING

OUR DEPARTED BROTHERS AND SISTERS

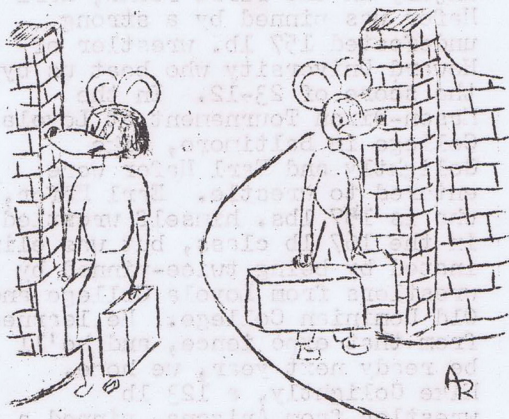
Despite our 3-9 won - lost record, the Prepsters competed well in swimming. Rodney Moreland improved consistently in the 200 yd free style. His time in the last three meets was 2:18.9, 2:18.8, and 2:17.1. That was a near assault on the Gallaudet record: 2:16. Steve Holst a steady in the 50 yd. free style, held under 25.4, but the record is still held at 2.51. Bruce Herzig's best time is 2:57 in the 200 yd butterfly. Ray, who was the most surprising swimmer, showed his best time in the 200 yd breaststroke - 2:53.

In the Mason-Dixon Tournament, none of the Prepsters was entered into the finals because we were eliminated from the trials. Those tough, opposing swimmers are too good for us, but they are very impressive to us. We learned a lot from those swimmers. In trials: Rodney Moreland's time in the 200 yd butterfly was 2:18.8; Bruce Herzig's time in the 200 yd and 100 yd butterfly was 2:51.9 and 1:14.9; that was his best time ever, (his previous best time: 2:57). Stephen Holst's time in the 50 yd and 100 yd free style was 25.3 and 1:01 respectively; Ray McDevitt's time in the 100 yd and 200 yd breaststroke was 1:19 and 2:59.5 respectively. I think our Prepsters will be terrific swimmers next year.

Several of our Prep brothers and sisters have departed from us this year, sad to say. Those who have left are: Pandy Thorsell, from California, who found no interest here; John Rompe, from South Dakota, who was more interested in working, George Cannon, from New York, because of his health, but he is expecting to come back next year, Charles McLaughlin, from Oklahoma, who wanted to be near his girlfriend back home, James Harper, from Ohio, because he wants to study to be a draftsman, Carole Holmes from Florida, who found no interest here, Charles Patneaud, from North Dakota, who wanted to go to Haskell Institute, Dixie Jochims, from Minnesota, because of preparation for her coming wedding next summer, Ronald Sittig from Louisiana, and Eddie Bachus from Mississippi, because they couldn't make the grades. There were a few more, but we haven't recognize them as they left after less than one month when the college opened last fall. We miss them but we wish them good luck in whatever they do.
